The emerging field of behavioral public choice theory examines the decisions and decision-making processes of public officials. This article is among the first to develop the field by considering a U.S. national and transnational security issue. The focus here is on key decisions of the George W. Bush administration to change U.S. policy regarding torture of terrorism suspects. The article recommends paths for multidisciplinary scholarship spanning academic and government communities that can generate norms of rational national security decision making.



David G. Delaney has taught at Brandeis University and Indiana University's Maurer School of Law and School of Public & Environmental Affairs. An army veteran, David later served as an executive attorney at the US Department of Homeland Security. He holds a JD from Boston College Law School, a MALD from the Fletcher School at Tufts University, and a BS from the U.S. Military Academy at West Point. His scholarship addresses national security, cybersecurity, decision making, and leadership (website).
