Nurturing a Collective Ethos of Sustainability: Some Experiments with Throwing Spaghetti at the Wall

We live in an unprecedented uncertain era, marked by the human re-engineering of the planet. Collective action at multiple levels will have to be an essential part of transitions towards sustainability. While there is much hope that springs from collective movements across the globe, yet collective action is still confined to a relatively small subset of people.

In Bangalore, where we have worked for over 15 years with a range of groups, including municipal bodies, lake collectives, schools and colleges, activists and corporate groups, we have experimented with different strategies for collective engagement. Some have worked, others have failed – in ways difficult to predict. It's been somewhat like throwing spaghetti at the wall to see what sticks.

In this talk I'd like to share some learnings from our engagement with linking academia to collective action in Bangalore – and to discuss some plans to link research and practice at a larger scale at the Ostrom Workshop.

Harini Nagendra is a professor of sustainability at Azim Premji University, India. Her research examines collective action for conservation in the forests and cities of South Asia. Her books include "Nature in the City: Bengaluru in the Past, Present and Future" and "Cities and Canopies: Trees in Indian Cities". She writes a monthly column 'The Green Goblin' for Deccan Herald, and a fortnightly column "Nature in the City" for the Hindustan Times newspapers.
